Juneteenth. An Apology.

During our last service together we said goodbye to the dearly loved Pastor Kelly, and welcomed the new pastors. What a day June 18th was! The tears! The prayers! The hugs! The grief! The excitement!

And in all that transitional energy we did not mention the tears, the prayers, the hugs, the grief, and the excitement of June 19th! June 19th, also known as Juneteenth, has only recently (2021) been recognized as a national holiday. My utmost apologies that I did not recognize this event or the celebration of it.

If you are not a YouTube enthusiast, or don't have a sense of humor, Juneteenth is a day that we remember when in 1865 a whole community of enslaved people was finally notified they had been legally liberated from their enslavement years prior. Their captors had intentionally withheld this information to continue to oppress these people in order to exploit the captors' benefit. So on Juneteenth, we celebrate the freedom of enslaved black people who would now be legally recognized as people and not dehumanized into mere property.

The irony is not lost on me that a group of white pastors would fail to give mention the significance of this holiday. On a national level, we have a culture of failing people of color as the norm. Our white-supremacist-dominated culture allows the automated social current to continue to erase the welfare of all those who are not privileged whites unless we actively swim against it.

I will do better. I will swim harder.

Inarguably, interrupting sin against disenfranchised people is the job of the church. Our sacred scripture tells us explicitly that we, the church, have been given the ministry of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5:18). We are told in this passage our new life of connection to God and community with one another is not just ours. We are expected to reunite those who have been outcasted. Furthermore, our United Methodist baptismal vows require each of us to "renounce the spiritual forces of wickedness, reject the evil powers of this world" and "resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves." White supremacy is tyranny itself.

Failure to recognize the ongoing suffering — as we know racism is alive and well despite the celebration of Juneteenth, the civil rights, movement, and your workplace's equity statement — is to allow space for evil.

With all the above in mind, I apologize for not including, at the very least, a mention of prayer about the freedom of our black siblings and their continuing struggle for equity in our pastoral prayer on June 18th. Please forgive me. I will continue to work at deconstructing my own biased worldviews to create spaces for the celebration and liberation of each of us as we each journey toward liberation.

With the music and prayers of the June 18th pastoral transition service still singing in my ears. and well fed afterward in body and spirit, I truly feel my new connection with you has begun. Since I've been retired for three years I did not expect a new pastoral appointment, but when the request came my soul said yes. The chance to work with Pastor Kate Kilroy was an enticement. But my affection for the Ronald congregation was the main reason to accept. I was your district superintendent during the years you felt a call to build housing, envisioned Ronald Commons, and made the bold decision to go ahead. The way the church worked through disagreements and uncertainty with a clear sense of mission left me with great respect for you. Now you are coming out of the pandemic's hardships with strength, eager to serve in new ways yet to be known and I am glad to be part of that this coming year. The Spirit is alive in you!

My quarter-time work area will be mostly organizational, with Pastor Kate doing the bulk of pastoral, worship and community work alongside you. Of course these things aren't entirely separate in church life, but we will do our best to keep things clear between us and with you. From now until early August I will be meeting individually with all the staff members, learning how things are organized, and noticing where I

can be useful. I also look forward to the get acquainted gatherings now being planned.

Then I will be going away, to walk a medieval pilgrimage route across Sweden and Norway called St. Olav's Way. I turned 70 this year, and it seems like a good moment to spend time alone with God in a beautiful place, away from the assumptions and habits of my ordinary life. Whether I complete the entire 360 miles on foot or accept some help from train or bus, I know God will be shepherding me all along the way. I expect to come back with both new clarity and new questions about my calling in this season of life. That will be the second week of October, joining the Fall season of church life in full swing.

For now we have summer time to connect.

Though I live in south Seattle, I have family in Lynnwood, so getting together won't be hard.

He will be attending Evergreen State College on a track scholarship.






